WEST HAM SKELETON - 30th March (report by John Oliver)

Thanks to a tip off from Maureen Garner, Mary went out to West Ham Park where it was reported that a skeleton had been found. While laying a new water main a digger driver had found some bones. Luckily he had informed the County Museum Service and one of the staff from

Winchester had spent a day on the site recording and lifting the skeleton. When Mary arrived the digger had revealed a second skeleton; as there was little that could be done at that time, arrangements were made for us to lift the bones the next day (Saturday) on behalf of the Museum Service.

Soon the telephone lines were busy with calls to Winchester and it was established that the first skeleton was probably of a Roman woman, dating evidence being provided by a bone hair pin. The only other finds had been some nails, probably from a wooden coffin, and green stains on the bones suggesting perhaps that coins had been deposited with the body, although there was no other trace of these.

The next afternoon, Mary and I with Barbara and Bob Applin arrived at the site. It was a perfect day for digging. The digger had obligingly cleared the top soil from the grave and it did not take too long to get down to the level of the bones. Unfortunately the skeleton was in a sorry state; both legs had been amputated just below the hips at the time of its discovery, the front of the skull was missing (possibly also by the action of the digger) and many other bones had decayed right away. When eventually everything was cleared up it was found that the shoulder bones, some vertebrae and most of the ribs and finger bones had decomposed. The grave had been quite neatly cut into the chalk, but the body had not been carefully placed, judging by the position of the bones, and the only accompaniment into the next world was a small broken piece of black pottery and one nail. We were glad to be able to help the County Museum Service by excavating this skeleton.

VISIT TO BUTSER ANCIENT FARM Sunday, 4th August

Another date to note is that of our visit to Butser, where Peter Reynolds is running the Ancient Farm probject (of which an account is given in the Hampshire Newsletter - see below). This is a most fascinating reconstruction of farming methods in the Iron Age, with

experiments in breeding sheep and pigs and growing the kinds of cereals known in the Iron Age, and storing corn in storage pits, also reconstructing Iron Age round houses, ovens and kilns. Peter Reynolds has agreed to show us round the site and also to give us a follow-up lecture in more detail during our next lecture season. For the visit, meet in the car park at Little Butser at 2 pm. Butser is just off the A3, halfway between Petersfield and Horndean, SU 717 203.

CHURCH COTTAGE EXCAVATIONS 1974 Preliminary Report

Excavations were carried out during Easter week 1974 at the rear of Church Cottage, Basingstoke, in order to gain further information on the present building, its development, and its possible precursors: previous excavations inside Church Cottage were reported in the BAS Newsletter for July 1973, No 9.

A 7m x 2m trench was excavated to a depth of 1.5m, parallel to, and 2m outside, Church Cottage hall. The following main layers and features were revealed.

Layer 1: Black loam, 70 cm deep, much building rubble. This appeared to have been deliberately deposited during the last half century to build up the ground surface; it filled a number of shallow pits and ditches contemporary with the use of the Church Cottage's coal fired boiler. Slate pencils, marbles and stoneware and glass inkwells dated to the late 19th century school; and a large quantity of earthenware, white glazed pottery and medicine and other glass bottles dated from the same period. The layer was cut both to the North by several pits dug to dispose of builders' waste, and also East-West by a recent waterpipe trench.

Layer 2: Grey clayey silt, 25 cm deep, cut in the south section by a brick privy.

Layer 3: Light brown silt, 20 cm deep.

Layer 4: Small stones and grit, grey clay, 10 cm deep.

Layer 5: Light brown and grey clay natural, excavated to about 25 cm depth.

Layers 3 and 4 appear to be the original ground surface and subsoil respectively. At the trench centre they were cut by a steep sided flatbottomed ditch running N-S, of depth lm and width lm (both measurements at original ground surface). 2m to the east, a chalk post setting 50 cm diameter by 15 cm deep was cut into the ground surface. No finds (other than tiny tile fragments) were made below the ground surface, and no medieval pottery above it - unusual in view of the frequency of 17th - 19th century pottery. This absence of finds suggests that the ground surface, which is suspiciously flat and even, has in fact been artificially levelled during the later medieval period, whether by normal yard cleaning or for building purposes. We are therefore almost immediately upon pre-medieval levels; the ditch produced (in addition to many pig bones) one large and two small fragments of Romano-British coarse pottery, and it is reasonable to regard the steep-cut ditch, the associated ground surface, and possibly the chalk packed post setting as of this date.

In conclusion, then, we may say that, since this post-setting is far too large to be a fencing or boundary post and is presumably therefore part of a building, the excavation appears to show the existence of Roman occupation on this site.
