At a Local History Week lecture at the Library, Alan Fielding received a 45-page handout listing holdings relating to Basingstoke in Hampshire Record Office. Barbara Applin has asked for another copy.

Hampshire County Council have now combined their Museums, Library, Arts, Countryside and Community services and Hampshire Record Office in a new Recreation and Heritage Department under the leadership of Mr Yinnon Ezra. Hampshire Record Office is now linked with the Museum Service under the overall leadership of the Head of Museums and Archives, Stephen Locke.

INVADERS: A DARK AGE MYSTERY

This exhibition is on at Andover Museum till 31st August and well worth a visit. It's a Hampshire Museum Service touring exhibition but won't reach Basingstoke till September next year. It is described as "the latest family-friendly interactive exhibition, which invites you to crack the clues left in the ground 1,500 years ago, using archaeological material unearthed by Channel 4's Time Team!" – with a warning note that human remains are on display – Anglo-Saxon burials from the New Forest.

Particularly exciting for us is the wonderfully decorated Anglo-Saxon buckle from Monk Sherborne, a real conservator's triumph.

The explanatory panels give insights into the way Anglo-Saxons understood their world and the impact of their settlement in Britain, and often they present varying interpretations. There are opportunities to design a decorated buckle, dress up in Anglo-Saxon costume and even try your hand at rowing. As the blurb on "Hantsweb" says, "this is a challenging and provocative exhibition, bringing you face to face with the past".

THE WHEATSHEAF, NORTH WALTHAM - AN UPDATE

I recently received a copy of "The Search for the Lost Roman Villa", written by Richard Tanner, Chairman of the North Waltham, Steventon, Ashe and Deane History Society. You may well remember that members of the BAHS and the NWSADHS did some fieldwalking in the field near the Wheatsheaf Hotel in North Waltham recently, where we found a wealth of Roman brick and tile, and also wall plaster and sherds of pottery. Mary Oliver wrote an account of the work carried out in the May newsletter and there is a display in the Local Societies exhibition ROUNDHOUSES TO ROUNDABOUTS on the top floor of the Willis Museum (until September).

Richard has been researching the history of the 'North Waltham Villa', a Roman site 'said to be near the Roman road from Silchester to Winchester, though the actual positions of both road and 'villa' were uncertain'. Richard has spent the last year or so trying to establish its exact location, and his publication reads like a detective novel, searching for clues in archives, Record Offices, books and publications, pulling together the strands of information. The result is a fascinating account of the history of the area around the Wheatsheaf, and the excavations carried out during the last two centuries, notably by Barbara Applin who dug on the other side of the A30 in 1969 (see our video BENEATH BASINGSTOKE). Although at this stage it is not certain whether we are dealing with a 'villa', it is clear that a Roman site has been identified, and Richard's publication is no doubt the first of many more to follow.

In his publication, Richard mentions the resistivity survey. In June members of the BAHS and the NWSADHS carried out their first resistivity survey in the field adjacent to the Wheatsheaf. Pippa Smith of Wessex Archaeology came to teach us about the use of the machine, and then left us to it. We managed to survey some 200 square metres, but the results so far are inconclusive, with no major anomalies showing up. Richard Tanner is planning further forays, and we are very much hoping to be able to survey the field where we did the fieldwalking, and where the finds show so much promise. It is clear that there is a lot more work to be done, and we are looking forward to working together with the NWSADHS in the future. Have we found the site of the 'lost Roman villa' or whatever it turns out to be? Only time will tell....

IMPRESSIONS OF THREE CHURCHES

More than 20 members and friends spent a very pleasant day at the end of June looking at three of the four churches in the United Benefice of North Waltham, Steventon, Ashe and Deane,

Our visit began at ST MICHAEL'S, NORTH WALTHAM, where the Rev Michael Kenning, Rector of the United Benefice churches, explained the debt due to the Rector at the time of the Victorian restoration (1865-66), Henry Carey, whose personal dedication and financial support ensured the preservation of what was then by all accounts a largely ruinous structure.

The church contains some evidence of earlier structures, including sections of 13th century work. Of particular note is the highly decorative 14th century piscina in the south wall of the sanctuary, and the pretty 15th century font, which was acquired from Popham church when it closed.

The modern altar frontal and lectern and pulpit falls, featuring an angel's wings, were designed by Atherton Harrison, who explained how the colours of the glass in the east window had influenced the design. She also designed the kneelers, choosing a countryside theme including birds, flowers and insects. The "odd man out" here, literally, is a kneeler depicting HMS Hood, worked by a Mr Cole in memory of his brother who died aboard her in 1941.



ALL SAINTS, DEANE, shares with St Michael's a narrow escape from dereliction; in this case averted in the 1970s by the sale of a tazza (a saucer-shaped cup) hallmarked in London in 1551, Only one other tazza from this period is known to have survived. It was given by Elizabeth I to the Tsar Ivan the Terrible and is kept in the Kremlin.


Fortunately the cup was bought by the Willis Museum, where it can be seen today. (*Postcard on sale in the Willis Museum*)

The PCC Secretary, Graham Talbot, gave us a very interesting talk about the church, its benefactors and principal features. Unusually for a church of this size, there are 8 bells in the tower. However, full peals are not rung for fear of bringing about the collapse of the structure, due to the absence of secure foundations! All Saints missed, by only a few years, the fame that attaches to St Nicholas' Church, Steventon, through the Jane Austen connection. Jane's father had the living at Deane and occupied Deane parsonage (now the home of the Lord Lieutenant, Mrs Mary Fagan) until 1771, when the family moved to Steventon Rectory (now demolished), where Jane was born in 1775.



All Saints dates from 1818, when the church was completely re-built as a thank offering for the victory at Waterloo. The style is Gothic and features a large amount of Coade stone, an early type of moulded concrete, used also for the lion on the South Bank of the Thames near County Hall, The Church is very light, thanks to the Coade stone and also to the sparing use of coloured glass. The colours of the glass are predominantly those of the national flag of Belgium, reflecting the Waterloo connection. There are some interesting memorial tablets, including one to a gentleman who died in 1666 at the extraordinary age (for those times) of 85,

Atherton told us that the Coade stone motifs inspired her designs for the kneelers here, They include the fleur-de-lys, Tudor rose and portcullis. The latter may reflect the Parliamentary connections of one of the church's patrons from Oakley Hall, but may equally be attributable to the fact that Coade stone mouldings were expensive and, once made, were used in various buildings.

After lunch the party reassembled at ST NICHOLAS, STEVENTON, which is structurally little altered since the 12th century. It is somewhat detached from the present day village, and its comparative isolation adds to the charm of its setting.

Among its treasures are the remains of a Saxon cross, recovered in 1952 from a wall of the original Steventon Manor, some early Victorian and medieval wall paintings uncovered in the 1980s and the "Digweeds' pew", a box pew now in use as the vestry.

There are many Austen memorials in the church itself, and some Austen graves in the churchyard, which is also remarkable for its 900 year old yew.

Atherton's designs can be seen here in the new set of frontals and falls, beautifully worked by Doreen Dean, and on the covers of the kneeler cushions. For the latter, Atherton chose flowers, reflecting the country setting of the church.

Brian Butler has sent us a copy of a programme for an Invitation Concert of the Basingstoke Choral Society (Fourteenth Season) held in the Town Hall on Tuesday, February the 10th 1903. The conductor was Mr H E Powell (Nancy's Uncle Harry), who

also performed a violin & pianoforte duet with Mr Charles Griffiths. His sister, Madame Blanche Powell, A.R.A.M, a professional singer, sang "When all was young", from Gounod's "Faust", as well as two other songs. Mr Powell's daughter, Miss Marion Powell, performed a "violoncello obbligato" [sic].

He also says that a letter from Nancy mentions that her Uncle Harry gave music lessons to the Royal Belgian family who were visiting Hackwood Park at the invitation of Lord Curzon of Kedlestone, the then owner. Uncle Harry taught Prince Charles and Princess Marie-Jose (to become Crown Princess of Italy), and Marie-Jose put some glue on the chair one day to play a prank on him!

iMap

A letter in *The Daily Telegraph* recently asked if there was a reasonably priced computer program that could be used for mapping historical sites, the distribution of artefacts and places. The writer wanted to place a symbol at a precise spot on the National Grid reference and to draw in and colour features such as rivers, roads and escarpments.

The reply described the program **iMap**, developed by the University of Leuven in Belgium, originally for mapping biological specimen data. It will import maps in most common formats and they can be calibrated by selecting and entering the co-ordinates of two diagonal points. There is a pre-calibrated high-resolution relief map of the UK. The program can plot symbols or characters from any installed font, so you can create many kinds of attractive and informative maps.
